# Novels in Series Project January -- December 2018

# Background

The cataloging of fictional materials has changed considerably since the 1990s. At that time assigning a single subject or genre heading to a work of fiction was not common. However, by the end of the decade changes in cataloging rules and the development of genre headings brought about significant changes in catalog records for fiction. Today it is not uncommon to see records with twenty five or more subject and genre headings from a variety of schemas.

Since novels in series form an important part of the fiction collection, the disparity in access points between early and recent records has been an obstacle for users of the catalog. In addition, the differences in the way series and subject headings were formed then and now created consistency problems. It was to address these discrepancies that I formed the idea of enriching catalog records for novels in series so that desired materials would be more accessible.

#### Objectives

- 1.) To make it easy for users to identify fictional series via the EPL catalog.
- 2.) To make catalog records clear and consistent so that users may easily find novels in series by authors names, by series titles, or by subject or genre headings.
- 3.) To provide clarity and consistency for series written by more than one author.

#### Status

As of December 27, 2018, 3564 series representing more than 1500 authors have been treated. A file containing the series processed may be found in the Series Project directory of the shared drive. It contains 490 and 800 MARC fields for each series, 6xx fields for character, place, topical subject, and genre headings, 700 and 740 fields for added authors and titles, as well as 400, 430, and 5xx fields from cross references in authority records. In addition, old forms of authors' names have been updated to current forms.

# Consistency in Series Entries

Lack of consistency in series entries has been a serious impediment to users identifying which volumes the library has. Consequently, the first task was to regularize series entries so that users could see series entries in their proper sequence. For example:

Note that a term that implies fiction has been applied to series titles in order to help users distinguish them from non-fiction materials. "Novels" is the most commonly used term, but "mysteries," "thrillers," "saga," and "trilogy" have been used where relevant. The emerging standard for identifying the volume is "bk." for book, unless the publisher used a more specific term such as "part" or "volume."

#### Cross References for Series

Eve Dallas novels

As series developed, they sometimes changed their names, gained additional authors, or were succeeded by similar series. Consequently cross references were created for each of these situations. For example:

# Subject Headings

Subject headings for fictitious characters, real organizations, imaginary places and organizations, topics, and geography are being added to catalog records for novels in series. Cross references are added where relevant. For example:

## Genre Headings

Since the late 1990s several genre schemas have been developed for catalog records. The best known are *Guidelines on Subject Access to Individual Works of Fiction, Drama, Etc.* (GSAFD) and *Library of Congress Genre/Form Terms* (LCGFT). Since both are used frequently in current catalog records, I have applied the best known genres in pairs. For example:

## Added Authors and Titles

Omnibus volumes for works of fiction are fairly common. In order to provide access points for all the included works, individual authors and titles as well as series entries have been added to the records. For example:

## **Authors Names Updated**

As time has passed, the form of some authors names has changed. Some names with foreign characters have become corrupted. Whenever I encounter these situations, I have updated the names to the current or correct forms. For example:

# Young Adult Fiction

Only in the past few years has fiction for young adults begun to be separated from juvenile fiction. To further this process I have changed the subdivisions for subject headings from "Juvenile fiction" to "Young adult fiction." I have also added a genre heading for Young adult fiction to each record. For example:
